- 1) Dream Whistlerz: The company provided a free demonstration on animation and digital arts and selected 10 students of BCAII/III for the free professional course (45 days) on animation and digital arts conducted by central Government. The students later received course completion certificates.
- 2) Secugenius: It is a Security solutions company which specializes in Cyber security, ethical hacking and penetration testing. The members of the company conducted a two day workshop for the students of BCA/PGDCA/M.Sc IT. This workshop aimed at imparting practical knowledge of ethical hacking, cyber security and security solutions. The students were given hands on training, a kit and ways to earn money online and be self-dependent.
- **3) WebKraft**: A unit of WebKraft unlimited conducted a short program "iscale" aimed at introducing practical application to the academic curriculum.
- 4) SPIC (Society for the promotion of IT in Chandigarh): SPIC IT Centre, PEC University, Chandigarh conducted one and a half month PHP course for the students of BCA/PGDCA to give them professional training in the field of web designing. The course aimed at helping the students enhance their employability skills and achieve their career objectives.
- 5) Vee Software Solutions (P) Limited: This company is our training partner in the field of IT and took classes of JAVA which is an academic course of the M.Sc. IT 2<sup>nd</sup> year students. The students were given theoretical as well as practical knowledge of the subject. The students were also given projects based on JAVA.

- 6) ilearn 24\*7 is a new startup venture aimed at providing online practical training to the students of BCA/PGDCA/M.Sc. IT in the subjects/area of their choice. Under the program the students were given an ID to access the ongoing/live projects of the company and be part of that. In this way they learnt to work on live projects.

The department of biotechnology has prepared a vision document for the creation of Chandigarh Colleges Biotechnician for participation in Institutional social responsibility and extension activities which further lead for national socio-economic development.

The idea for CCBM was born during an interactive workshop "On need based changes in the existing curriculum of Biotechnology" organized under the Aegis of Deptt. of Higher Education, Chandigarh Administration, at P.G. Govt. College for Girls, Sector - 42, Chandigarh on 14th December, 2012. The workshop was attended by Biotechnology teachers form various Colleges, who shared the common problems of limited resources, student placements and also lack of practical application of biotechnology due to very limited industries in the Northern Region. The workshop had two special invitees, Dr. Parikshit Bansal (I/C of the IPR Cell from NIPER, Mohali) and Dr. Gurmeet Kaur Nanda, AGM, Panacea Biotech., Mohali. Dr. Bansal floated the idea of a common initiative in Biotechnology on part of the Chandigarh colleges to benefit the common man. He proposed the setting up of IEDS (Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Cell) in the Biotechnology department of every college, so that spin-off companies are born in the Chandigarh region and biotech students become job creators rather than job seekers. He also proposed the modification of existing syllabus of B.Sc. to include theory and practical Courses on innovation and entrepreneurship development and flexibility to students of biotechnology to take up already being offered courses in entrepreneurship and business development as evening or distance

learning courses. The idea was enthusiastically supported by all teachers and decision was taken to practically implement the idea and develops a framework for execution. CCBM is the outcome of that meeting.

CCBM has well defined thrust areas and objectives for Biotechnology applications as below:

# THRUST AREAS:

- Nutrition (Human and Animal)
- Healthcare (Medicinal plant, germplasm, identification and propagation/ certified extracts for medicinal use)
- Energy conservation (bio-fuel promotion as an alternative to LPG)
- Pollution control (Biotechnology interventions for managing water pollution/ sludge disposal and also air pollution caused by foul gasses form city garbage)
- Employment generation at UG/PG level

# **OBJECTIVES**:

- **1. To promote production and use of Vegetarian proteins:** from bio-waste e.g. oyster mushrooms/ spirulina in mid-day meal schemes and messes/canteens of educational institutes in Chandigarh and also promote production and use of low-cost, protein rich 'animal feeds' for augmenting milk production.
- 2. To promote production and use of biotech based tools for germplasm identification and propagation and also preparation of certified extracts of medicinal plants: DNA based identification for authenticating exports of the plant materials, extracts and also quality controls. Tissue culture for rapid propagation of rare and endangered medicinal plants. Certified extracts to convert low value produce into high value products.
- 3. To promote production and use of bio-fuels as an alternative to LPG/ petrol/ diesel: Wheat straw/ bio-waste e.g. fallen leaves, based fuel pellets are a 'carbon neutral source' of energy, which can be used to replace LPG in hostel messes and canteens. Ethanol pumps in colleges can promote use of bio-fuel driven vehicles.

- **4.** To promote production and use of microbes/ earthworms for combating water and air pollution: Microbes can treat city sludge and clear streams/rivers. Vermi-composting can prevent city air fouling, by removing obnoxious smells and preventing emission of foul smell, yielding a valuable bio-fertilizer (vermi-compost) as a by-product.
- 5. To promote employment generation amongst students: by setting up of IEDC (Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Centre) in Biotech Department of every member college of CCBM, developing linkages with Biotechnology Incubators in India and Abroad, providing funds to start-up companies/spin-offs vide National Entrepreneurship Development Board, TEPP scheme etc. and also supporting growth of 'Biotech Ancillary Support Unit' or BASU, which supply products to well-established larger industries.

STRENGTH: Department has good setting where beginners can easily learn basic microbiology techniques. Students are encouraged to get hands on experience on laboratory techniques. Laboratory is well equipped with instruments and reagents used in basic microbiology (BOD COD Incubator, Spectrophotometer, Shaker, LAF Cabinet, etc.). Multimedia smart rooms for power point presentations are available.

WEAKNESS: Teaching practical aspects of life sciences demands high expenditure. Strong financial assistance is required for expensive reagents (enzymes) and teachings kits. If provided ample funding, department will be more confident to teach sophisticated laboratory techniques as per syllabus.

OPPORTUNITY: Chandigarh is education city of the region and students have good exposure. Various prestigious academic institutes (PU, IMTECH, NIPER, IISER and AIIMS) are located in Chandigarh and its vicinity. Students have possibilities to go for higher studies in these institutes. This point is of particular importance as parents of many students are not willing to send their girls far for studies. Our own college has started M.Sc. Microbial Biotechnology course last year. Various pharmaceutical and food industries are also located near Chandigarh. Job oriented students can seek jobs of their interest. Doors are open for national and international institutes after completing B.Sc. Microbiology. It is well known that there is no dearth of opportunity in academics, research and industry.

CHALLENGES: Faculty members concentrate particularly on evoking interest in students who are from rural background. Many students feel it very difficult to switch to English language as mode of communication. It is a challenge for faculty to raise students to global standards.

**FUTURE PLANS:** Our department is thinking of organizing coaching classes for under graduate students for entrance in to Master courses. We are also planning to purchase expensive instruments like thermal cycler, Western blotting equipment and refrigerated ultracentrifuge. We are also interested in establishing our own multimedia smart room for greater ease.

- CHALLENGES: It has been observed that the students of Union Territory, Chandigarh who do their 10+2 from the CBSE, New Delhi lack basic knowledge of Punjabi language and literature as they study Punjabi as a second language from 4th class to 10th class whereas the students who do their 10+2 from the Punjab School Education Board, SAS Nagar (Mohali) have better understanding of the language as they study Punjabi as a compulsory subject upto 10+2 level .So the teachers have to make an extra effort to bring them at par with students from Punjab and devote extra time to them to teach him as to how to read write and speak Punjabi as it is a compulsory subject in the first year of three year degree courses in arts, science, commerce and computer science faculty.
- FUTURE PLANS: The Department, as a short term plan, proposes to focus primarily on the interest of students, improve their performance in Punjabi, develop their skills in language proficiency and in enhance their job prospects. It has been a spoken and official language for thousands of years. Even today, Sanskrit as a subject which is being taught and studied in more than 400 Indian and foreign Universities.

Many of our ancient writers used Sanskrit as a medium for writing not just traditional subjects, but various modern subjects like Science of Medicine (Ayurveda), Science of Architecture, Astronomy, Astrology, Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Political Science, Economics, Public Administration, Law, Mathematics, Agriculture, Geography, Music, Dance, different fields of Engineering etc. also evolved through it. Hence, Sanskrit is to know more about the remarkable achievements of our forefathers and derive benefits from such knowledge to supplement and build future researches. Its literature can help to innovate new paradigms in research related to humanities, scientific technological and sociological areas.

WEAKNESS: Now-days, in India, Sanskrit are studied through different regional languages like Hindi, Punjab, Gujrati, Marathi, Oria etc. Out of India, it is also studied through many foreign languages like English, German, French, Chinese etc. Hence, there are very few people, who use this language in their day-to-day life are in the form of their mother tongue. But, otherwise, it is the only Indian language, which has no boundries.

**OPPORTUNITIES:** Besides teaching in Schools, Colleges and Universities, students SSR (Cycle - II) Evaluative Departmental Report P.G. Govt. College for Girls - 42, Chandigarh Page | 208

of Sanskrit can work as translators and deciphers in museums or with the Archeological Department. There are thousands of Sanskrit manuscripts lying in libraries all over the world to be read and edited.

Students can work as language officers in Banks, Religious preachers in Army or abroad, Ayurveda and yoga experts. Many students opt Sanskrit as a main subject for civil services.

As Sanskrit is the mother language of most of our Indian regional languages, it helps students in better understanding of their mother tongue as well as foreign languages like Latin, Greek, French, German, English etc. Punjabi enjoys a special status as it is closer to Sanskrit, especially to Vedic Sanskrit. Sanskrit has also been considered as a computer friendly language.

CHALLENGES: Most of the students belong to Punjab and Punjab is a non Hindi speaking state. There are very few schools, where Sanskrit is being taught. That is why, in B.A.- I year more than 60% students opt Sanskrit for the first time. Therefore, it is a big challenge to teach them his language, but once they start learning Sanskrit, they pass out with flying colours.

#### **FUTURE PLANS:**

- 1) For the growth of the subject as well as of the students interdisciplinary approach is the need of present scenario, hence, we plan to introduce Sanskrit language as an optional Subject in B.Sc. (Medical & Non-Medical)/B.Sc. Biotech/ Bio-Informatic/ B.A. Classes. As per P.U. Chandigarh norms, the students who have done their Matriculation (10<sup>th</sup> class) with Punjabi, will take Punjabi (compulsory) in B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com.- I year, while others have to study History and Culture of Punjab (HCP). But, as Sanskrit belongs to the old Punjab and most of its literature is written on this land, hence, we plan to introduce this language as optional subject along with HCP.
- 2) We also plan to introduce Functional Sanskrit as an Elective subject in B.A. classes.


